#### **GIVE IT YOUR BEST**

At first glance the Posuk seems to repeat itself: Hashem called Moshe, Hashem spoke to him... Why is it even necessary to say "Vayikroh"? The Gerrer Rebbe, the Lev Simcha zy"a, offers a beautiful explanation. This Parsha follows on from the previous Parsha, the last of Sefer Shemos, Pikudei. There we find that Moshe, despite trying his best, was unable to enter the Ohel Mo'ed, as it says : ולא יכול משה לבוא אל אהל מועד. But we know from Chazal that if you try your best, Hashem will help you. Therefore this week's Parsha begins with "Vayikroh", which, as Rashi explains, is a warm invitation. The message is clear: You may not be able to achieve your goal on your own. But if you give it some effort, then Vayikroh; Hashem will invite you in...



One of the first things we do every morning is *netilas* yodayim, however most people delay making the brochoh until just before davening. This is because there is a machlokes haposkim whether the main netilas yodayim is after waking up or in preparation for tefilloh.

Rav Shimon Shwab zt"l points out that whenever we do a *mitzvah* with our bodies, we recognise our own personal *kedushoh* and exclaim, 'asher kideshonu bemitzvoisov...' Rav Shimshon Refoel Hirsch zt"l takes this a stage further and says that when we wash our hands in the morning we are dedicating our hands, and really our whole bodies, to a life of active avodas Hashem. Our hands are the most active parts of our bodies; they create, build and reach out to others. Through *netilas yodayim*, each and every one of us becomes like a kohen in the Beis Hamikdosh who had to purify his hands before performing the Avodoh, which itself was very physical and labour intensive.

The secret of hand washing is that the word *netiloh* literally means to 'lift up'. Through washing our hands, we elevate them and our whole lives to a higher level.

Q: WHY ARE WE THANKING
